




## Less and Less Material in the Federal Channel



- Over the past 20 years, an average of 550,000 cubic yards of material has been dredged from the channel.
- However, recent dredge volumes have been lower likely due to the lack of sand on beaches in more northern parts of Ventura.
- 2024: 365,000 cubic yards
- 2025: 360,000 cubic yards

## **Dredging Material Placement**



- With a reduction in material available and the amount of erosion in recent years, it has been important to maximize placement.
- The dredging contractor has provided a retainment dike to slow the migration of sediment into the ocean and allow more sand to stay on the beach.





- 2025 entrance channel dredging complete, sand trap complete
- Surplus funds will carry over
- FY26 Funding for Ventura Harbor established in President's Budget
- House and Senate must still ratify the FY26 funding
